

Hans Medick, retired Research Fellow from the Max-Planck-Institut fuer Geschichte, Goettingen (Germany). Until 2004 Professor of Modern History and Historical Anthropology, University of Erfurt.

Professor Medick graduated with a PhD in History from the University of Erlangen- Nuernberg in 1971 after studying History, Philosophy and Political Science at the universities of Cologne, Heidelberg and Erlangen-Nuernberg. From 1973 to 2004 he worked as full-time Research Fellow at the Max-Planck-Institut fuer Geschichte at Goettingen. During this time he held teaching appointments at various universities both in Germany and abroad (in Europe at the universities of Goettingen, Hannover, Basel and Zuerich). From 1980 to 1981 he taught as Visiting Professor at the Department of History at Johns Hopkins University (Baltimore), in 1997 as William Andrews Clark Distinguished Professor of Early Modern History at UCLA and again in 2002 as Visiting Professor at the Department of History at UCLA; in 2008 he held an appointment as Distinguished Visiting Professor at the Department of Germanic Languages and Literatures, George Washington University, St. Louis. During the winter term 2011 he was Oliver Smithies Visiting Lecturer and Senior Guest Fellow at Balliol College, University of Oxford. From October to December 2011 he was invited as Senior Fellow of the Country of Lower Saxony at the Herzog August Bibliothek, Wolfenbüttel.

From 1997 to 1999 Hans Medick taught as professor of Medieval and Modern History at the University of Goettingen, in 1999 he was appointed Professor of Modern History and Historical Anthropology at the newly founded University of Erfurt, where together with Alf Luedtke he founded the "Arbeitsstelle Historische Anthropologie" (Center for Historical Anthropology) and directed it until his retirement at the end of 2004.

During his time at the Max-Planck-Institut fuer Geschichte in Goettingen Professor Medick founded or co-founded several international research projects and collaborated with them: "Proto-industrialisation" (with Peter Kriedte and Juergen Schlumbohm), "Family History" (with Karin Hausen, Michael Mitterauer, Heidi Rosenbaum and David Sabean), and "History and Anthropology" (with Robert Berdahl, David Cohen, Jack Goody, Esther Goody, Alf Luedtke, David Sabean, Gerald Sider).

He was from 2004 to 2011 Research Coordinator and participant in the interdisciplinary research project "Selbstzeugnisse in transkultureller Perspektive" (Self-Narratives in Transcultural Perspective) which is financed by the Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft (German National Research Council, DFG) and is located at the Free University of Berlin. He has worked and is working on several projects in connection with this research activity: in 2008 he published a new digital text and research resource with four previously unpublished seventeenth-century personal accounts in the world wide web "Mitteldeutsche Selbstzeugnisse der Zeit des Dreissigjaehrigen Krieges" (accessible at: www.mdsz.thub.uni-jena.de).

In 1994/1995 Hans Medick held an appointment as fellow at the Wissenschaftskolleg at Berlin (Berlin Institute for Advanced Study). From 1995 to 1999 he served as member of the executive committee for Early Modern History within the Association

of German Historians. Before and after his retirement Hans Medick served on numerous academic committees, including the search committee for the New Leibniz Chair in Early Modern History at the University of Hannover (2009) and most recently (2010) a committee appointed by the Saxon Academy of Sciences at Leipzig to evaluate the work of the Research Team at the Herzog August Library at Wolfenbüttel, which is editing the papers of the first scholarly academy in seventeenth-century central Europe, the "Fruchtbringende Gesellschaft."

In 1993 he co-founded the journal "Historische Anthropologie. Kultur-Gesellschafts-Alltag," (which appears with Boehlau publishers, Vienna-Cologne-Weimar), and he has served on its editorial board since then. He also serves on the advisory boards of three other journals: "L'Homme. Europäische Zeitschrift für feministische Geschichtswissenschaft", "Österreichische Zeitschrift für Geschichtswissenschaften" and "Sozial.Geschichte." He is co-founder and co-editor of the publication series "Selbstzeugnisse der Neuzeit" (Self-Narratives of the Modern Age), which appears with Boehlau publishers, Vienna, Cologne, Weimar.

Professor Medick has researched and published widely in the fields of social, economic and cultural history of the early modern period, but also of intellectual history and especially on the theory and methods of history.

Recent and forthcoming book publications: He is currently working on a monograph: "Wahrnehmungen eines Weltkriegs. Der Dreissigjährige Krieg aus mikro-geschichtlicher Perspektive" (Perceptions of a World War. The Thirty Years War from a Micro-Historical Perspective).
