In his lecture Jonathan Brack explores the interreligious debates at the Mongol court in late medieval Iran (the Ilkhanate, 1260-1335) by examining the theological and polemical writings of Rashid al-Din (d. 1318), Persian vizier and Jewish convert to Islam. Rashid al-Din used his disputations of Buddhism and Judaism to chart new paths for the Islamization of his Mongol patrons' model of divinized sacred kingship.
