

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- A first university degree (i.e. bachelor's degree) in History and Cultures of the Middle East with a focus on Islamic Studies or an equivalent degree, comprising at least 180 ECTS.
- Minimum of 60 ECTS earned in courses relevant to the study of history and societies of the Islamic world.
- 40 of the 60 ECTS earned in courses that impart written (B2 level CEFR) and oral Arabic language skills (B1 level) or equivalent – or proof of secondary or tertiary education in an Arabic-speaking country.
- 20 of the 60 ECTS earned in courses focusing on other relevant topics to the study of history and societies of the Islamic world (not language skills-focused).
- English language skills corresponding to the C1 level (CEFR).
- German language skills not required.

History and Societies of the Islamic World is a research-oriented consecutive master's program at the Department of History and Cultural Studies with a focus on **history, politics, religions, cultures, knowledge formations, and normativities of Islamic societies from the beginnings of Islam to the present**. The regional focus lies on West Asia and North Africa as well as on Muslim Europe, with special attention to global perspectives and interconnections. The program is taught entirely in English.

The program requires a bachelor's degree in History and Cultures of the Middle East with a focus on Islamic Studies, or an equivalent degree in a closely related subject. It offers an overview of the current state of research and central debates in the study of the history and societies of the Islamic world and trains students in various research approaches and methodologies.
