

# About the workshop

The Art of Diplomacy: Material Culture and the Practice of Gift Exchange in the Late Joseon Dynasty is jointly supported by the Academy of Korean Studies and the division of East-Asian Art History at Freie Universität. The workshop explores the political significance of diplomatic gifts and the act of gift-giving and receiving as a social convention and ritual protocol, the role of art as a gift, the social networks built upon gift-exchange, and the multiple agents involved throughout the process. Focusing on the role played by gifts as a part of diplomatic and cultural encounters in Sino-Korean and Korean-Japanese relationships during the Joseon era, as well as exchanges with Western countries in the early twentieth century, this workshop examines gift-exchange practices and images of gift-exchanges in addition to the gifts themselves.
