Challenges for the Korean Civil Society after the Democratic Transformation

– Experiences of the Post-Socialist Countries in Eastern Europe and Reunified

Germany –

What is the particular challenge for the civil society after the democratic transformation? The planned conference at the Freie Universität Berlin will focus on this question, undertaking a comparative analysis of the experiences in the Republic of Korea as well as the post-socialist countries in Eastern Europe and reunified Germany.

In the Republic of Korea as well as the countries of Eastern Europe civil society was the driving force in the struggle against the authoritarian regime. The important role which the civil society has played in the transformation process has been a constant topic of academic discussion since the democratization in the RoK in 1987 and the collapse of the socialist block in Eastern Europe. However, the fact that the civil society itself is influenced by the democratization process and undergoes its own changes has not found much attention yet. This leaves important questions unanswered: Which role does the Korean civil society play in the democratic consolidation process? If the civil society is expected to play a different role than in the resistance movement against the authoritarian regime, the question arises how and to what extent the civil societies in the RoK and Eastern Europe meet these expectations?

On the one hand, the civil societies in the RoK and Eastern Europe as well as in reunified Germany share the same experiences, being the latecomers of democratization. On the other hand, their experiences differ from each other insofar as the RoK has not been confronted with the task of system transformation. From the viewpoint of entire Korea (North and South) experiences of Eastern European countries and reunified Germany are of special importance.

The aim of the conference is to find new approaches for the study of civil society and democracy in Korea, combining interdisciplinary and transregional research, directly contributing to the research in the field of "democracy after democratization".
