About HCS

The courses are designed to ensure a balance between interdisciplinary and subject-specific modules. The aim is to deepen knowledge of scientific methods and promote professional exchange in a research-intensive environment. The teaching languages are English and German.


Doctoral students are also members of the Dahlem Research School, which aims to impart interdisciplinary key qualifications in addition to scientific skills. These include project management, presentation techniques and scientific communication in German and English.

HCS includes subjects that work historically, deal with material, visual and written cultures, research antiquity as well as the present, examine literatures, textual traditions and languages of cultures in the Near and Middle East, deal with various regions in East Asia or deal with religions and cults. The doctoral program unites these approaches in the common interest of combining a cultural studies orientation with subject-specific knowledge and skills and developing a practice of interdisciplinary work.



HCS takes into account both the tradition of the German Kulturwissenschaften as well as the Anglo-American Cultural Studies developed on (socio-)political issues. On the basis of these two discourse formations, the program offers the opportunity to put one's own research into perspective from a cultural studies perspective and to discuss it regularly. Participation in the HCS requires both profiund specialist knowledge and a keen interest in theoretical and methodological issues at an interdisciplinary level.

The program does not award scholarships, however we are happy to support you in applying for doctoral scholarships!

Location

The academic location of Berlin, with its numerous university and non-university institutions, museums, collections, archives, libraries and rich cultural offerings, provides an ideal environment for academic work.

In addition, research networks and projects at the department, at Freie Universität and at other institutions in Berlin enable intensive exchange on site as well as networking with international guest researchers.

The workplaces of the doctoral candidates of the HCS are located in the building at Koserstraße 20, where the joint library of the History and Art History departments is also housed. The other institutes and the campus library are within walking distance at Fabeckstraße 23-25. Other Freie Universität facilities such as the University Library, the Botanical Garden and a canteen are also located in the immediate proximity, as are the Dahlem Research Campus of the State Museums, the Museum of European Cultures (MEK), the Max Planck Institute for the History of Science (MPIWG) and the Secret State Archives of Prussian Cultural Heritage.
